

## Bachelor of Veterinary Nursing [BVN]

To be read in conjunction with Unitec's Academic Statute and associated Policies and Procedures.

These programme regulations apply to Bachelor of Veterinary Nursing [BVN] programme, which leads to the award of the Bachelor of Veterinary Nursing (Level 7), (360 Credits) [Ref:3995] qualification.

These regulations come into effect from Semester 2, 2021.

### 1. Ngā Ture Hei Whakaurunga | Admission Requirements

*Admission Requirements comply with Unitec's Admission Requirements Guidelines.*

To be eligible for admission to this programme, all applicants must meet three admission requirements:

- Requirements for either general admission, special admission, or discretionary admission
- Any additional Programme specific requirements
- English language requirements

#### 1.1 Whakaurunga Whānui | General Admission

To be admitted to this programme all applicants must be at least 16 years of age on the date of the programme's commencement for the semester in which they wish to enrol (or provide a completed Early Release Exemption form), and meet the following requirements:

A minimum of 42 credits at NCEA Level 3 or higher on the National Qualifications Framework, with 14 credits at Level 3 or higher in each of two science-related subjects, with a further 14 credits at Level 3 or higher taken from no more than two additional domains on the National Qualifications Framework;

**And**

a minimum of 14 credits at Level 1 or higher in Mathematics or Pangarau on the National Qualifications Framework;

**And**

a minimum of 8 credits at Level 2 or higher in English or Te Reo Maori; a minimum of 4 credits must be in Reading and a minimum of 4 credits must be in Writing;

**Or**

At least 3 'C' passes in the New Zealand University Bursaries Examinations in science or health science related field, where appropriate or equivalent;

**Or**

Successful completion of an appropriate qualification at Level 3 or above in a science or health science related field, where appropriate or equivalent;

**Or**

Equivalent.

#### 1.2 Whakaurunga Motuhake | Special Admission

Applicants must have:

- attained the age of 20 years on or before the first day of the semester in which study for the programme is to commence; and
- provided sufficient evidence of aptitude or appropriate work or other life experience that would indicate a successful outcome in the qualification.

#### 1.3 Whakaurunga Kōwhiringa | Discretionary Admission

In exceptional cases an applicant who does not meet the general admission requirements and who has not reached the age of 20 on or before the first day of the semester in which study for the Certificate is to commence may apply for discretionary admission. Applicants must have:

A minimum of 68 credits at NCEA Level 2 in their best four subjects;

**Or**

Have a maximum total of 12 in New Zealand Sixth Form Certificate in their best four subjects;

	<p><b>Or</b> Equivalent.</p> <p>In assessing whether to grant discretionary admission in exceptional cases, the primary focus will be on the applicant’s level of preparedness for study at the required level</p> <p><b>1.4 Whakaurunga Tautui   Programme Specific Requirements</b> In addition to meeting the requirements for general, special, or discretionary admission, applicants must:</p> <p>a. have completed at least three days’ work-experience in a veterinary clinic before applying for this programme</p> <p><b>AND</b></p> <p>b. provide:</p> <p>i. a letter of recommendation from the clinic at which they completed their work experience;</p> <p>ii. a reference from an employer where the prospective student has worked with the public; and</p> <p>iii. a reference from a teacher (or similar) attesting to the applicant’s social skills.</p> <p><b>AND</b></p> <p>c. sign a consent form that allows Unitec to complete a search of a Ministry of Justice convictions database</p> <p>i. In the event this search uncovers any un-declared convictions, the relevant application will be referred to the Admissions Committee.</p> <p><b>AND</b></p> <p>d. provide a completed medical declaration indicating there is no evidence of a medical condition that will affect their ability to practice safely as a veterinary nurse;</p> <p><b>OR</b> Successfully completed the New Zealand Certificate in Animal Technology Level 5 or equivalent</p> <p><b>OR</b> Successfully completed the New Zealand Diploma in Veterinary Nursing Level 6 or equivalent.</p> <p>Applicants whose veterinary nursing qualifications include credits at Level 4 may be admitted to the <i>Bachelor of Veterinary Nursing</i> following successful completion of additional courses from the NZCAT or NZDVN schedule as required.</p> <p><b>1.5 Whakaurunga Reo Pākehā   English Language Admission Requirements:</b> Applicants must have achieved a minimum standard of English as demonstrated by a minimum of 8 credits at NCEA Level 2 in English (4 in Reading, 4 in Writing).</p> <p>International applicants must also provide evidence that they have the necessary English language proficiency required for the Programme as demonstrated through the use of evidence of one of the kinds described in <a href="#">NZQA Rules</a> on the Unitec <a href="#">English Language Requirements for International Students</a> Web-page.</p>

Paearu Kōwhiri Tukanga   Selection Criteria &amp; Process</b></p> <p><i>Selection Criteria and Processes comply with Unitec’s Admission Requirements Guidelines</i></p>	<p><b>2.1 Paearu Kōwhiri   Selection Criteria</b> When the number of eligible applicants for admission exceeds the number of places available, the following selection criteria will be applied:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• previous academic history;</li> <li>• motivation to complete the programme;</li> <li>• written and verbal communication skills; and</li> <li>• general aptitude</li> </ul> <p>Applicants who meet the maximum number of listed criteria will be the preferred candidates.</p> <p><b>2.2 Tukanga Kōwhiri   Selection Process</b> Selection will be made by Unitec staff members with the delegated authority to offer places to applicants. These staff members will select students on the basis of written information supplied on the enrolment form. At the discretion of the staff members, an interview (face-to-face or electronic)</p>

may be required. A list of delegated staff members is maintained by the Programme Academic Quality Committee (PAQC) responsible for the programme.

**3. Ngā Ture Hei Whakawhiwhi Tohu Mātauranga | Requirements for the Award of the Programme**

*Requirements for the award of this Qualification complies with Unitec's Programme Completion and Awards Policy and associated procedure.*

**3.1 Whakaemi Tūtukitanga | Credit Accumulation**

To be awarded the *Bachelor of Veterinary Nursing*, a student must successfully complete a minimum of 360 credits in the pattern set out in Table 1 from the courses set out in Table 2.

Students who are prevented by ill health, or other cause, from completing the programme requirements within the maximum period of enrolment, the relevant academic authority may approve suspension of enrolment for up to a maximum of 12 months The maximum period to complete this Programme is 8 years.</p> <p><b>3.5 Whakawhiwhi Tāpiripiri   Additional Awards</b></p> <p><b>3.5.1 Exit Award</b> To be awarded the Exit Award of <i>New Zealand Certificate in Animal Technology [NZ2490; Ver:1] (Level 5, 120 credits) OR New Zealand Diploma in Veterinary Nursing [Ref: 2491; Ver:1] (Level 6, 120 credits)</i>, student must have:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>accumulated the number and level of Credits described in the regulations of that Qualification; and</li> <li>lodged a completed application to be awarded the Milestone Award with the Graduation Office; and</li> <li>as part of the application, declared that he or she does not currently intend to enrol or continue in the study of the Qualification.</li> </ol> <p>An exit award will not be awarded to any Student who has, at the time of application for the award or at the time of the award, enrolled in future semesters for any Course which is part of the Qualification.</p> <p><b>3.5.2 Senior Scholar Award</b> To be eligible for consideration to receive a Senior Scholar Award a student must have:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>achieved a cumulative Grade Point Average (GPA) of 8.0 (there is no rounding) or better across all degree courses for which s/he has been assessed in the programme; and</li> <li>achieved at least 2/3 of the total credits for the degree through enrolment in Unitec courses (i.e. have achieved no more than 1/3 of the credits by cross credits from another institution or by the assessment of prior learning).</li> </ol>

Students enrolling in the Bachelor of Veterinary Nursing will receive credit for courses completed as part of the *New Zealand Certificate in Animal Technology* (Level 5, 120 credits) [NZCAT] and/or the *New Zealand Diploma in Veterinary Nursing* (Level 6, 120 credits) [NZDVN]. #### 5. Waeture Aromatawai | Assessment Regulations

#### 5.1 Paparahi Aromatawai | Assessment Basis

Assessment in this programme is achievement based using an 11-point grading scale. Students must obtain at least 50% overall score in any achievement based course in order to pass that course.

#### 5.2 Ākoranga Taumata | Course grades

Course grades will be determined by the mathematical aggregation of weighted assessment marks and reported according to the following scales. Participants must obtain at least 50% overall score in order to pass achievement-based assessment.

Aromatawai Mahinga   Assessment Procedures</b></p> <p><i>Assessment Procedures comply with Unitec's Assessment Moderation and Grades Policy and associated procedure.</i></p>	<p><b>6.1 Ākoranga Aromatawai   Course Assessment</b>  Courses employ both formative and summative assessment activities. Formative assessments do not contribute to the final grade for a given course. All summative assessment elements are compulsory unless otherwise approved and noted in course information.</p> <p>Students must attempt all compulsory assessment activities in order to pass and receive credit for any course. Students who do not attempt a compulsory item of assessment may be awarded a 'Did Not Complete'(DNC) for the whole course and may not earn any credits.</p> <p><b>6.2 Aromatawai   Roto   Te Reo   Assessment in Te Reo</b>  All students have the right to submit any summative assessment task in Te reo Māori. The process for submission of summative assessment work in Te reo Māori is governed by the Unitec Assessment in Te Reo Māori procedure and detailed in course material.</p> <p><b>6.3 Tāpaetanga Tōmuri   Submission and late submission of work</b></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>The due dates for all summative assessment work will be notified at the commencement of each course.</li> <li>Any assessment that is submitted late (and does not have a prior approved extension) will be penalised by a deduction of 10% per day of the participants assignment mark, up to five (5) days, inclusive of weekends.</li> </ol>		

- c. Applications for extensions must be made in writing to the relevant Academic Authority responsible for the assessment at least 24 hours before the due date. All applications must be accompanied by supporting evidence. An extension of up to five days may be awarded.
- d. Any extension will be carried out within a specified time period as agreed with the relevant academic authority and no further extensions will be granted.
- e. No assignment will be accepted five (5) days (inclusive of weekends) after the due date. If the assessment is not compulsory, the participants will receive a 'zero' grade for that assignment. If the assignment is compulsory, then the participants will receive a Did Not Complete (DNC) grade for the entire course.

#### **6.4 Whakamātautau Anō | Resubmission or Reassessment:**

A student may apply to undertake a resubmission/reassessment for a failed assessment within 5 days of receiving their marked assessment. Award of a re-sit and/or re-submission is offered at the point of course results ratification at the end of each semester.

- a. Students are entitled to only one reassessment or resubmission per course.
- b. Resubmission/Reassessment is not available for any controlled assessments (i.e. tests, and examinations).
- c. All resubmissions/reassessments will be carried out within a specified time period as agreed with the relevant academic authority.
- d. In all cases for resubmission, the original marked assignment will accompany resubmitted assignments. If resubmitted work is not accompanied by the original marked assignment, the resubmitted work will not be marked and the original grade will stand.
- e. The maximum grade for any resubmission/reassessment of an assessment is the lowest pass grade.
- f. Assignments that are handed in late are not eligible for resubmission or reassessment

#### **6.5 Āhutatanga Aromatawai Motuhake | Affected Performance Consideration:**

A student may apply for Affected Performance Consideration (APC) if:

- The student is unable to attend an examination, compulsory assessment or fixed time and place assessment activity due to illness, injury, bereavement or other critical circumstances
- The student's preparation for, or performance in an examination or any summative assessment has been seriously impaired due to circumstances beyond their control

Applications for APC are made by a student within 5 working days of the affected assessment event. Decisions to approve an APC and to apply any remedy are made according to the Assessment and Grading Procedures and Regulations.

#### **6.6 Pāhi Rāhui | Restricted Pass**

A restricted pass may be awarded in a course which was narrowly failed and where there is ample evidence that marginal failure is compensated by good overall performance.

- a. A restricted pass is awarded at the discretion of the relevant academic authority and may not be applied for directly by a student.
- b. The relevant academic authority may, at their discretion, use a restricted pass to:
  - set conditions for future performance in other courses;
  - prevent a student from using a restricted pass to meet the prerequisite requirements of another course.
- c. A student may decline the award of a restricted pass by notifying the relevant academic authority in writing not later than 20 working days from notification of the results.

#### **6.7 Tuaruatanga | Repeating Courses**

Students who are repeating a Level 1–8 course would normally be required to submit all assessment items. In some cases, with the prior approval of the relevant academic authority, students may not be required to repeat an equivalent assessment item that they had previously passed. This should be negotiated within the first two weeks of the commencement of the course and will specify any course grade that will be carried over.



	<p>Students may enrol and repeat a course that they have failed only once.
